# What Are Job Analysis & Job Evaluation?

## Job Analysis

A systematic process of gathering information about a job's duties, responsibilities, required skills, outcomes, and work environment. It provides a detailed understanding of what a job entails.

Job Evaluation A systematic process of determining a job's relative worth within an organization to ensure fair and equitable compensation. It focuses on the value a job brings to the company.

These two distinct yet interconnected processes are fundamental to effective human resource management, forming the bedrock for strategic talent deployment and reward systems.

# Why Job Analysis Matters



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## Clear Job Descriptions

Defines precise duties, responsibilities, and reporting relationships, providing a roadmap for employees.



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## Training & Development

Identifies skill gaps and training needs, fostering continuous professional growth within the workforce.



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## Performance Appraisal

Establishes objective performance standards, ensuring fair and consistent evaluation processes.



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## Workforce Planning & Recruitment

Supports strategic hiring and talent acquisition by clearly outlining job requirements.



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## Organizational Alignment

Aligns individual employee output directly with broader organizational goals, enhancing productivity.

# Key Elements in Job Analysis

## Job Description

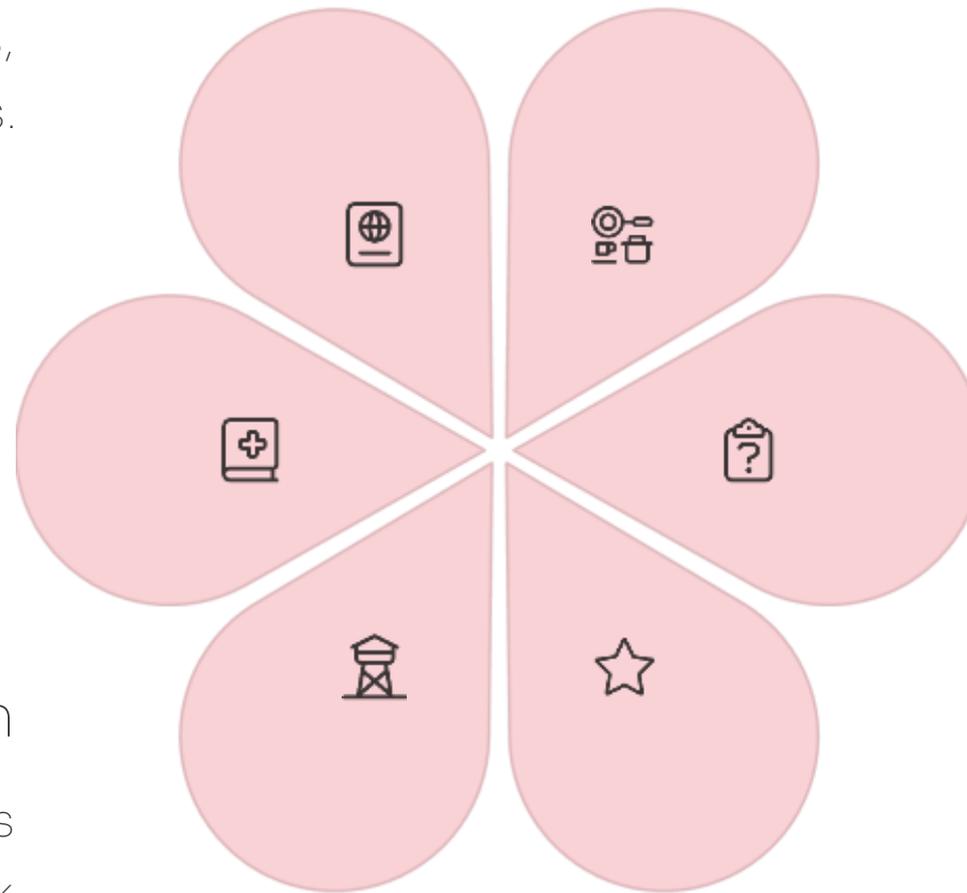
Details duties, responsibilities, reporting lines, and working conditions.

## Job Diaries

Employees record their activities over a period, offering a detailed task log.

## Observation

Directly observing employees performing their tasks in the work environment.



## Job Specification

Outlines qualifications, skills, knowledge, abilities, and experience required.

## Interviews

Direct conversations with incumbents and supervisors to gather insights.

## Questionnaires

Structured surveys to collect information from multiple employees efficiently.

# What is Job Evaluation?



## Compensation Planning

Determines a job's worth for establishing fair and competitive pay scales.



## Internal & External Equity

Ensures fairness across jobs within the organization and competitiveness with external markets.



## Employee Motivation

Links job value to pay structure, fostering motivation and job satisfaction among staff.



## Focus on the Job

Evaluates the inherent demands and responsibilities of the role, not the individual's performance.

# Common Job Evaluation Methods



## Ranking Method

Simple method where jobs are ordered from highest to lowest in overall value or difficulty.



## Classification Method

Jobs are categorized into predetermined classes or grades based on their general characteristics.



## Point Factor Method

Points are assigned to various compensable factors (e.g., skill, effort, responsibility, working conditions) for each job, then summed.



## Factor Comparison

Benchmarking against key jobs and ranking them by individual compensable factors, which are then monetized.

# Job Analysis vs. Job Evaluation

## Job Analysis

Focuses on studying and understanding the nature, responsibilities, and requirements of a job. It results in detailed job descriptions and specifications that help in hiring, training, and performance evaluation.



## Job Evaluation

Determines the relative value or worth of a job within the organization. It is used mainly for creating a fair compensation structure and ensuring internal equity.
