Personalised development roadmaps that design individual growth trajectories, clearly outlining progression steps and required competencies.

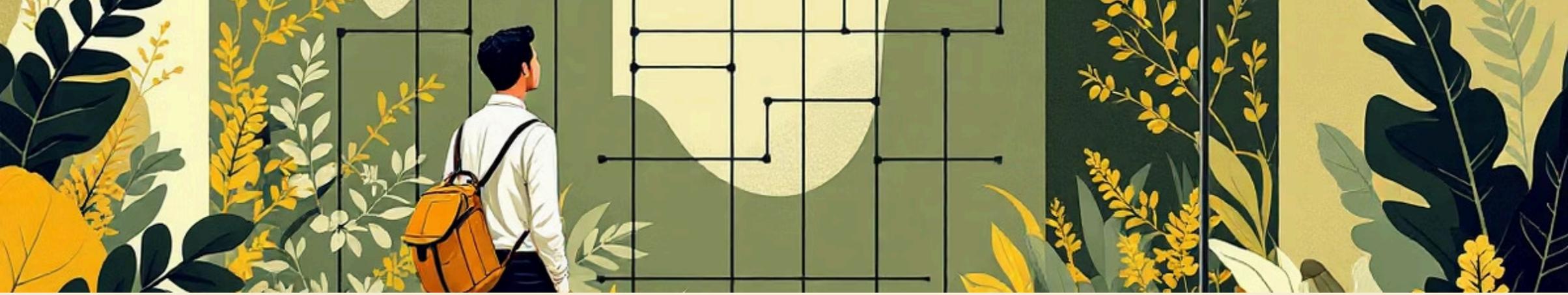
## Leadership Development Programmes
